Mission Statement

The Carroll County Health Department's mission is to prevent disease, injury and disability by promoting healthy behaviors and preserving the natural environment through health education, environmental protection, community needs assessment, emergency preparedness, and the provision of necessary service.

The Carroll County Health Department is committed to fulfilling our mission by working cooperatively with other community agencies to complement their services but not to duplicate them.

Public Health Services

Community Health Promotion and Education

Community health promotion and education services are available upon request to address major factors of ill health such as smoking and tobacco use, substance abuse, sedentary lifestyle, environmental hazards, family stress and other risky behavior. We also offer classes for CPR and first aid.

IPLAN

The Illinois Project for Local Assessment of Needs (IPLAN) is a community health assessment that is conducted every five years by local health jurisdictions in Illinois. The plan is then submitted to the state for approval. The most recent IPLAN was approved in 2019.

Lab Draws

Adult lab draws are now offered at the health department at a reduced cost. Labs are drawn at our office and sent to Quest Laboratory. Results come back to the health department within 2-3 days and will be shared with primary health care providers.

Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)

Our Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program serves low income pregnant and post-partum women and their children to age 5. They are given supplemental food instruments, health screenings and nutrition and breast-feeding education.

Average Monthly Caseload: 180

Pitter Patter Pantry

Is a non for profit organization that lends WIC moms a helping hand. By completing family friendly activities WIC parents can earn Baby Bucks and can use them to purchase items at the Pitter Patter Party. In Calendar year 2019, \$8,022 in Baby bucks were used to purchase 289 packages of diapers, 135 packages of wipes and 22 car seat along with other clothing and miscellaneous items.

Family Case Management (FCM)

The goal of the FCM program is to create healthy self-sufficient families by working with women prenatally and throughout the perinatal period. These services include client assessments, health, prenatal and childbirth education, child development assessments and education, and referrals to additional social agencies. The monthly average is:

Healthworks

Provides medical case management to all foster children under the age of 6. The goal is to make sure each child has a medical provider and that they are receiving the recommend screening (vision and dental), that they are current on immunizations and that they receive the appropriate well checks from their physicians.

Communicable Disease Surveillance

The department maintains continuous surveillance of infectious diseases, regularly monitors other key community health indicators, and develops plans in collaboration with community partners to address identified priority health concerns.

Immunizations

Low-cost immunizations are provided at regular and special clinics for a range of childhood and adult diseases. The purpose of this program is to prevent the spread of diseases including influenza. The Health Department is a Vaccine for Children (VFC) provider which allows us to provide immunizations to children 18 and under for a reduced fee.

Off site immunization clinics held: 18

Immunizations administered: 1301 (494 flu & 807 other)

Tuberculosis (TB) Control Program

TB control services main objective is to detect TB, both active and inactive. Prevention therapy for inactive cases of TB is an important role, as well as educating health care workers and the general public about TB.

TB Screenings: 46

Childhood Lead Poison Prevention

The Lead Poison Prevention Program provides outreach for the identification and screening of high risk children in targeted areas of the state. In addition, follow-up for those children identified with lead poisoning is provided.

Smoke Free Illinois Communities

Illinois Tobacco Quitline is a program available through the American Lung Association and partially funded by the Illinois Department of Public Health. Quitline provides counseling services for individuals wanting to quit smoking as well as nicotine patches at no cost.

Great American Smoke Out is an event we partner on with the American Cancer Society. The health department also follows up on public smoking complaints. Informational letters may be sent out as well as citations issued to violators (individuals or businesses).

Emergency Preparedness

This program is dedicated to working with health department staff and community partners. Together we develop, maintain and update health department response plans that link into the county emergency response system. The goal is to help keep the public safe in the event of a public health emergency.

West Nile Surveillance

This program allows for the collection and testing of mosquitoes and birds for West Nile Virus. The information collected is reported to Illinois Department of Public Health. Within this grant the health department works with Carroll County Municipalities by offering classes and larvicides at no charge to control mosquito population.
